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Introduction

How can young people from the neighborhood inform the community design process and learn new architecture and design skills along the way? What is the role of design and urban planning in community safety?

How can improvements to our streets, buildings and parks contribute to more peaceful and vibrant communities? To answer these questions, Chicago Mobile Makers, Studio Gang and the Goldin Institute joined forces with the Garfield Park Rite to Wellness Collaborative to launch the Youth Design Leadership for Community Safety (YDL) project, a hands on design program aimed at empowering youth in Garfield Park and giving them the tools to design their future environment.

The program launched on May 5th, 2021 and will continue through installation of a signature public sculpture in Spring 2022. The cohort of Youth Design Leaders participated in community-led planning and design projects focused on creating safe space, promoting community wellbeing, and increasing access to opportunity. This experiential program helps youth establish a foundation in architecture and urban planning skills to make a real impact through design.

Authentic and meaningful community engagement is a prerequisite for design interventions to be credible and effective in reducing violence and promoting safety. YDL's strategy not only engaged a wide spectrum of community voices, but also transferred the knowledge and skills of design thinking throughout the process, and gave local youth the opportunity to learn-by-doing alongside professionals in the field.

The Youth Design Leadership for Community Safety program in Garfield Park builds on several prior and ongoing efforts to engage youth in designing and shaping a safer environment. In 2018, Studio Gang launched the pilot Youth Design Leaders program in Memphis, TN to support the design of Tom Lee Park. YDL was also informed by the Goldin Institute's cohort model that prioritizes learning-by-doing with a community of practice. In 2021, Studio Gang and the Goldin Institute joined with the Mayor's Office of Violence Reduction (MOVR), and the Garfield Park Rite to Wellness Collaborative (GPRTWC), to develop the Neighborhood Activation pilot program. This intensive effort enlisted a wide range of outreach and engagement strategies to foreground neighborhood voices too often left out of critical conversations.


As part of the Neighborhood Activation program, the community and design partners developed a plan to transform a city owned vacant lot on Madison Street in West Garfield Park into a Community Plaza replete with a roller rink, play space, furnishings, lighting, and hub for neighborhood resources.

The resultant 3D sculpture conceptualized and designed by the YDL cohort will be installed at this new vibrant community space.

Youth Design Leadership for Community Safety (YDL) is a free 6 month program for local students between the ages of 13 and 18 that explores designing for positive community change. Chicago Mobile Makers led the pilot 12 sessions in collaboration with Studio Gang Architects and the Goldin Institute. This handson program connected to larger initiatives happening in Garfield Park and focused on creating safe space, promoting community wellbeing, and increasing access to opportunity. Participants established a foundation to communicate, advocate, and make an impact through design.

More than 30 young people applied for the program and 14 were admitted. Each participant received a welcome package that included a stipend, merch, and a personal iPad and digital pencil with drawing and design apps that they were able to keep for future use.


About 10 students came regularly. Each participant earned a total of \$1200 to attend the program.

The Youth Design Leadership program introduced the young participants to the fundamentals of design and explored community safety by combining hands-on educational workshops, participation in community conversations as investigators, and immersive practical experience gained by working alongside the Chicago Mobile Makers, Studio Gang and Goldin Institute teams.

The challenges and opportunities identified by the youth design leaders in this innovative program will inform how design and improvements in community spaces can uplift and support the good work that is already happening in Garfield Park and offers concrete design ideas for the City to coordinate investment at a block-by-block scale.

Each week, students were guided through a unique design exercise. They envisioned, designed, and drew positive alternatives for empty lots, created 'healthy community' collages, and ultimately designed a large 3D sculpture that will be fabricated and installed at 4008 W Madison—the new roller rink in West Garfield Park.

Over the 12 sessions, **the Youth Design** Leaders designed a 3D public sculpture that reads "RECLAIM" to symbolize the power of activating a formerly vacant lot for a new, positive community use. Their design is ambitious and inspiring.

Chicago Architecture Biennial

Chicago's fourth Architecture Biennial, The Available City, explored the impacts and possibilities of vacant public spaces on cities today. The Biennial asked designers to use vacant lots as a way to "experiment in new possibilities of how to explore and activate space."1

The theme of the Biennial tied nicely into the goals for the Youth Design Leadership Program and offered a city wide laboratory where world-class designers thought through similar questions and problems as the YDL cohort.

Like the participants in the Biennial, the students analyzed and interrogated the history and reality of underutilized lots in the city and developed their own proposals for how to reintegrate and capitalize on these open spaces. The resultant RECLAIM sculpture will be sited in one of these vacant lots, bringing it into dialogue with the other works being developed across the city.

On September 18, 2021, the YDL participants, Chicago Mobile Makers, Studio Gang, and the Goldin Institute presented their work at the Arts **Club of Chicago** as an invited partner program to the Chicago Architectural Biennial. The teams from Studio Gang and the Goldin Institute started the presentation with a short overview of the Neighborhood Activation strategy and shared how the Youth Design Leadership program was a key part in activating and transforming vacant lots in West Garfield Park.

Five Youth Design Leaders then presented the 3D sculpture and the process they used to bring their new design skills in service to the community. They shared their reflections on the program and their enthusiasm for seeing their ideas come to life with the installation of the sculpture at the 4008 West Madison Community Plaza and roller rink in West Garfield Park.



Next Steps

Given the energy and dedication of the YDL participants, the program was extended another six months. Ten students will participate in Phase 2 of the pilot where they will have the opportunity to be involved in the actual fabrication of the 3D art piece. The team will meet once a month over the course of six months and will visit architecture offices and fabrication shops, track the progress of the 3D art piece build, and learn more about different types of design and design approaches to the city and environment.

The Goldin Institute, Chicago Mobile Makers, and Garfield Park Right to Wellness Collaborative are excited by the success of this pilot program and are looking forward to continuing and expanding this collaboration into the future.
